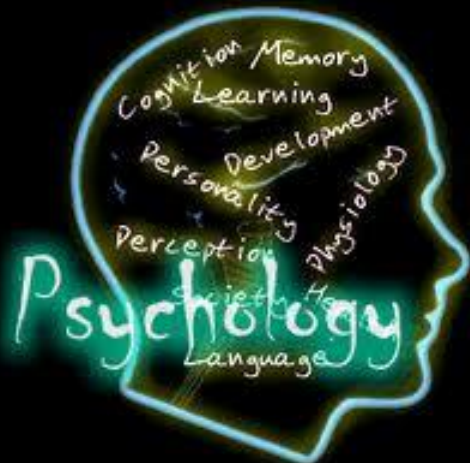

Concerned with systems of rules created and enforced through social or governmental institutions to regulate practices and rules of conduct between the organs of the government and subjects of the state.

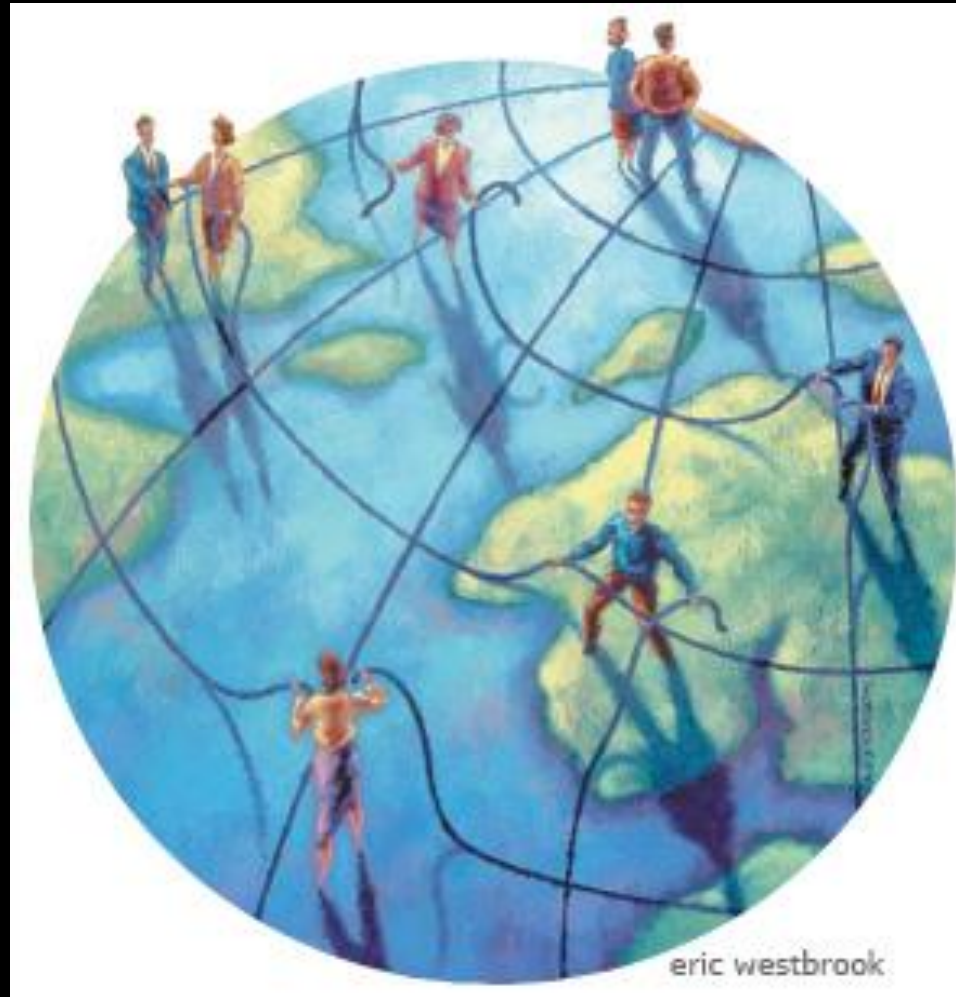

# UNEMPLOYMENT



## 20,000 die each day

Extreme poverty claimed more than 20,000 lives yesterday with common diseases, including chest infections and diarrhoea, accounting for a third of the victims. Another 20,000 people are expected to die from treatable diseases today - and again tomorrow.

The three biggest killers - acute watery diarrhoea, diarrhoea and malnutrition - took nearly 10,000 lives, the majority of them children under the age of five.

More than 10,000 of the deaths yesterday were in just four African countries: Nigeria, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Ethiopia and Tanzania.

Franny O'Connor, 33, an Australian aid worker in Ethiopia with Médecins Sans Frontières, said her biggest frustration was the lack of affordable medicines to treat diseases such as malaria, HIV/AIDS and kala-azar - a parasitic disease that can be fatal if left untreated.

"Kala-azar and malaria are maddening, HIV/AIDS is horrendous, yet the majority of Ethiopians do not have access to basic health care or life-saving drugs as they die," she told the Herald.
